Saturday and Seeonee Packs Report

During these last 3 months, there was a mix of outdoor and indoor meetings and so many different topics were addressed. Several Cubs shared their interests with the rest of the Pack and at the same time had a go at several badges.

One indoor meeting included a close encounter with two guinea pigs, which Bagheera Betty, one of the volunteers with Nature Trust's Wildlife Rescue Team was nursing back to health. Later on these will be released back in the wild. Bagheera is licenced by ERA to take care of hedgehogs and other legally protected species of local wildlife.

One meeting was all about the compass – the compass rose, the main parts of the compass, their names and their functions, what it is used for, how it works, how to hold it and use it. Some games, videos, explanations and hands on examples helped to make these points easier to understand. The Cubs then got to use their new compasses and practised finding and following a direction of travel. Another outdoor meeting included an instruction by the Ventures on how to light a fire taking into consideration all the safety features.

A hike to Wied il-Mielaħ and its 'window', a natural limestone arch, located on the north-western coast of Gozo, gave the Cubs the chance to apply the Country code; use their senses to look, listen, feel, touch and even taste what was around them; learn more about endemic, indigenous and alien species, of which various examples could be seen along the way; notice the practice of terracing of fields and the reason behind them; observe what irrigation methods are used in the fields; discuss the role of rubble walls which prevent soil erosion, allow the passage of excess rainwater and provide a habitat for different species; listen to hidden underground water courses; observe the mini-dams along the way and finally admiring the window, noting its fissures and the pounding waves crashing against it and link this to weathering and erosion and the power of water. The importance of taking nothing but photos and memories and leaving nothing but footprints was stressed throughout the hike.

Other outdoor meetings were held at Ta' Blankas Olive Grove. During one particular meeting the Cubs learned about the secret language of trees and that underneath the tress and intertwined with their roots, lies a microscopic network of fungi. This is responsible for transfer of water and nutrients between trees. Older, taller trees recognize the root tips of their relatives, especially weak saplings and favour them when sending nitrogen, carbon etc through this underground network. These hub trees can detect the ill health of their neighbours from distress signals, and send them needed nutrients. They warn their neighbours about invasive predators or to inhibit growth of invasive plant species. The surrounding trees can then defend themselves by releasing chemicals to deter predators or pathogenic bugs. Trees can also send a stress signal to nearby trees after a major forest disturbance, such as deforestation, drought or an insect attack. All this was very, very interesting and almost magical, someone commented. And indeed it is!

The (Hidden) Benefits of Camping

I am certain that a week or two of camp life is the best rest-cure and the best tonic for both mind and body that exists for a man, whether he be boy or old 'un. And for both it is a great educator. Lord Baden- Powell.

Having recently returned from the Group's Easter camp, now might be the right time to dwell on this experience and share a few thoughts about the (maybe not so evident) benefits of camping, for children, youths and adults.

Camping offers so many benefits that go beyond just enjoying the great outdoors, exploring new places, learning new things and being immersed in and connecting with nature by spending more time in the outdoors.

Campers develop self-confidence and independence:

Camp offers a unique experience for children – the chance to be away from parents for a short period of time and learn to handle things on their own. At camp children develop confidence in their own ability to make decisions and solve problems. Just being "on their own" is a huge confidence builder for them, and they feel more self-reliant after being responsible for themselves and their belongings for a few days. At camp, children and youths have the opportunity to live and thrive without being with their parents and under their constant scrutiny. The growth in confidence and independence happen at camp **BECAUSE** the parents are not there.

Camping teaches new skills, builds resilience and teaches problem-solving, adaptability and responsibility.

The physical and mental health benefits of camping are immeasurable. It builds resilience and teaches life and survival skills, as well as commitment and perseverance. Campers learn to adapt to changing conditions and find creative solutions.

Camping takes us all out of our comfort zone and into an unfamiliar environment where we will need to adapt, solve problems, improvise and cope with whatever comes our way, whether it be starting a fire, dealing with unpredictable weather conditions, setting up or taking down tents, fixing a broken tent pole, taking care of our kit, sharing the same tent with others, sealing an airbed leak or even just cooking a meal. Taking risks, learning to cope with and facing the challenges of life and to bounce back from adversity, developing relationships with other adults and peers develops resilience, responsibility and self-esteem, and this is beneficial for all.

Unplugging from Screens:

Camping provides a screen-free environment. Devices, social media and the various apps and games can limit our social skills; affect our sleep and impact on our anxiety levels. In the great outdoors, you don't find computers, tablets or televisions and there's so much else to do that does not require electronics. Without constant digital distractions, people connect with nature and each other. Camping provides an opportunity for team-building and improving communication skills.

Appreciating the simple things in life:

Away from screens and technology, one learns to appreciate simple pleasures like watching awesome sunrises and sunsets, stargazing, listening to the seagulls mewing or the waves hitting the cliffs, storytelling, singing and laughing around a campfire, getting all caked in mud while building a clay oven, running down a valley or climbing up a hill, building a pioneering project and enjoying the beauty of natural landscapes.

Appreciating nature:

Getting up close to local flora and fauna fosters an appreciation and responsibility for our natural environment. First-hand observation can also stimulate one's thinking and encourage a greater awareness and understanding of the world around us.

Experiencing Stress Relief and Relaxation:

Nature acts as a powerful stress reliever. Camping allows one to escape the hustle and bustle of daily life, providing a much-needed break.

Breathing in fresh air and boosting energy levels:

Camping provides fresh air which benefits lung health, boosts energy levels, sharpens mental acuity, and contributes to overall happiness. Even the most lethargic children seem to gain energy from being outdoors.

Engaging in physical activity and exploration:

When you're camping, you can't help but engage in physical activity. Whether it's hiking, swimming, canoeing, climbing, or playing outdoor games, campers engage in healthy movement.

Living with others and forging lifelong friendships:

At camp we learn to live with, feel accepted and accept others even though we are all different. We are part of a team and we all work together for the benefit of that team.

Creating lasting memories:



•Through the BeActive Scheme by Agenzija Żgħażagħ, the Group will be getting funds which will support an overseas expedition by the Rovers as part of their training programme.

BeActive is a scheme where youth organizations apply for funding by developing a community project related to a number of priority topics while Assistance For You (A4U) aims to support youth organizations by providing funding for initiatives that either improve their facilities or increase their resources.
